








# Weather Symbols

Use these weather symbol cards to create an informative bulletin board in your classroom. Each morning, ask a child to go outside and report to the class the type of weather he finds. Have him or her choose the appropriate weather symbol and attach it to the class calendar. The student should also record the temperature and the wind direction. Later in the afternoon, ask another child to follow the same procedure. Discuss these weather changes with your class. Older children might like to bring in the weather section of the local newspaper and compare their predictions and the accuracy of the weatherman with the actual conditions.
